HOW YOU CAN HELP



Turn off lights that are not in use. Remove decorative exterior lights from your property and use wildlife friendly lights in coastal communities.



Apply window film with a net visible light transmittance of 30% or less. Close opaque window coverings after dark to reduce interior light trespass.



Leave flashlights, cell phone lights, toys with lights, and other temporary lights at home.



Dune vegetation produces habitat for wildlife, screens artificial light, keeps sand in place, and protects coastal homes from storm surge. Protect dunes by not walking through them.



Follow the requirements in your local lighting ordinance for sea turtle protection.

THE PROBLEM OF ARTIFICIAL LIGHTS



Adult and hatchling sea turtles use natural cues to make their way to the ocean. Artificial light

from coastal properties can disrupt these natural nesting and emergence cues. Adult females may be deterred from nesting on the beach and hatchlings often become confused or

disoriented, leading to death from dehydration, exhaustion, or predation.



WILDLIFE FRIENDLY LIGHTING BENEFITS

- Improved human health (sleep cycles, mood, headaches, etc.)
- Restored night vision
- Using LEDs saves energy
- Clear views of the night sky
- Compliance with lighting ordinances
- Protects endangered sea turtles and other wildlife

THREE RULES TO WILDLIFE FRIENDLY LIGHTING



Keep it Low. Use low mounting heights, wattages, and lumens. The lower the fixture, the less likely it is to be seen from the beach.



2 Keep it Shielded. Shield fixtures so you cannot see the source of light. Shielding also helps direct the light down to the ground where it is needed.

Keep it Long. Sea turtles are less disturbed by longer wavelengths of light (560 nanometers or longer). Long wavelength lights appear amber, orange, or red in color.
