This holiday season, Sea Turtle Conservancy's (STC) lighting team is giving sea turtles in the Florida Panhandle a priceless gift: beachfront properties with sea turtle friendly lighting. See page 3 for before (left) and after (right) pictures of properties STC recently retrofitted.

As the 2017 nesting season comes to a close, it's important to understand and make arrangements for marine friendly beaches throughout the year. During sea turtle nesting season, you may know that removing beach furniture and picking up trash before dark keeps the beach safe for

sea turtles. While these things are a great start, there is more that you can do during the winter months. One of the best ways you can help sea turtles and ensure you are adhering to your local lighting ordinance is to change your beachfront lights to wildlife certified fixtures and bulbs. This should be done before the next nesting season.

If your property has unshielded fixtures with white bulbs, nesting females may stay away

The Passing of an Icon

Sea Turtle Conservancy mourns the passing of Landon T. Clay, who served as Chairman of STC's Board of Directors from 1992 until his passing, at the age of 91, on July 29, 2017. Mr. Clay was a World War II veteran, a successful businessman and a renowned investment manager, but he was most well-known as a generous philanthropist and supporter of various intellectual, scientific and conservation causes. A graduate of Harvard University, Landon founded the Clay Mathematics Institute, which encourages and rewards new achievements in mathematics. Mr. Clay enjoyed supporting cutting-edge pursuits in science and biology, and this interest undoubtedly led him to join the Board of STC (known then as Caribbean Conservation Corporation) in 1988. Landon made his mark on the organization almost immediately – establishing STC's first Development Committee in 1989 and working to grow the resources available to support sea turtle research and conservation.

"Landon was the most influential Board member in the history of the organization," said David Godfrey, STC Executive Director. "The organization went through some very challenging times finding its footing after the passing of Archie Carr; if not for Landon this organization would not exist today." Godfrey added, "For me personally, Landon was a guiding force and mentor when I was appointed executive."

Among other things, Landon established the Emily T. Clay Endowment at STC, which provides permanent support for the position of Scientific Director. The endowment was named after Landon's mother, who was a founding member of the organization dating back to the 1950s. Landon's influential presence on the Board will be missed greatly. His spirited guidance and enthusiastic support for the work of Sea Turtle Conservancy will never be forgotten. Given that the Clay family has been represented on the STC Board of Directors dating back 60 years to the organization's founding, a new member of the Clay family will be appointed soon to carry Landon's bright torch. 🐢

In Caribbean cultures, **Velador** translates as "one who stands vigil" —referring to turtle hunters who waited at night for turtles to come ashore. Now STC claims this title for its newsletter, and around the world STC's researchers and volunteers are replacing poachers as the new veladors. The **Velador** is published for Members and supporters of the nonprofit **Sea Turtle Conservancy**. STC is dedicated to the conservation of sea turtles through research, advocacy, education and protection of the habitats upon which they depend.

from it, but if they do nest nearby, hatchlings may emerge and crawl toward your lights instead of crawling toward the ocean. They may even become disoriented and wander aimlessly around the beach for hours, burning up the valuable energy that they need to make it out to sea. This can be prevented by practicing the three golden rules of turtle friendly lighting on your beachfront home:

1. Keep it shielded. Shielding a fixture directs the light downward where it needs to go. Shielding a fixture or bulb also prevents the light source from being seen from the beach.

2. Keep it long (wavelength). Sea turtles are less affected by long wavelength light (560 nanometers and above), which is used by wildlife certified amber or red LED bulbs. White bulbs utilize short wavelength light which gives off violet, green and blue light on



the electromagnetic spectrum. Wildlife certified amber LED bulbs will save you energy, provide a candlelit ambiance and save sea turtles.

3. Keep it low. By lowering a light on your property, it decreases the chance that a sea turtle will see it and become disoriented. Keeping it low also puts light closer to where it needs to be depending on the application, such as on a sidewalk or pathway.

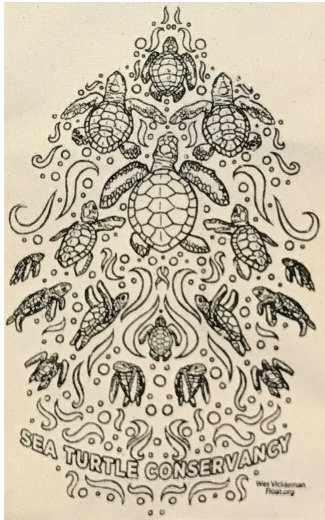

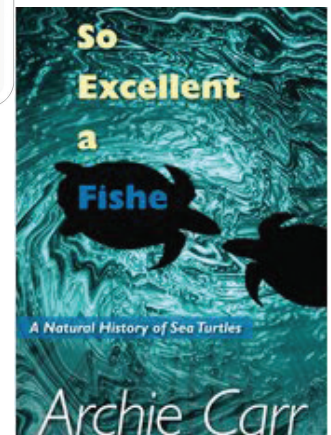

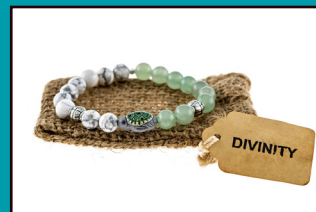

Volunteer Spotlight: Molly Ayers

Molly Ayers began volunteering at STC's Gainesville office almost four years ago as a middle school student. Because of her age, Molly was only allowed to perform low-level office tasks at first. Gradually, however, she took on more responsibilities and was soon invited to accompany staff to the annual Tour de Turtles kick off events at the Barrier Island Center. No matter what she was asked to do, Molly approached the task with eagerness and a positive attitude – proving her dedication to sea turtle conservation. Today, as a junior in high school and with college firmly in her sights, Molly continues to volunteer at the STC – and once again she assisted with the Tour de Turtles launch, now helping to scout for turtles and assist STC's Technology & Research Specialist Dan Evans with the satellite attachment process. We sat down with Molly to talk to her about her experience with STC.

When did you start volunteering at STC?

My first day volunteering was in February of 2014. I was a twelve year old in seventh grade at Howard Bishop middle school.

Why did you want to volunteer?

When I was ten years old, I had the wonderful opportunity of attending an Eco-Explorer summer camp at the Barrier Island Center in Melbourne, Florida. At the end of the week-long camp, we all went on a walk at night looking for sea turtles. I witnessed a Loggerhead sea turtle nesting, and fell in love. It broke my heart to think that these creatures were endangered. I did some research, and contacted the Sea Turtle Conservancy, where they welcomed my enthusiasm.

Creating interactive games to help educate people is hard work, but it pays off immensely when I get to see kids and adults having fun while learning. Through my time at STC, I have come to love not only the turtles, but the people behind the conservation.

What are your career aspirations?

I am currently working towards my Associate of Arts degree, and plan to become a marine biologist in order to work on sea turtle conservation.

The Finish Line: Tour de Turtles Update

After three long months, the Tour de Turtles migration marathon has finally come to an end! Who ended up on the podium this year? In our Leatherback category, Soca from Team Atlantis claimed the crown, swimming an astonishing 5,250 km! In 2nd place was Lincoln from The Explorers Club with an equally impressive 4,050 km. In 3rd place was Tortuga Turista II representing the Patel College of Global Sustainability, with 2,640 km. The remaining two leatherback competitors, Marina and Soropta, put up a good fight but ultimately got washed away by the competition, swimming “only” 2,200 km and 1,640 km respectively.

In the Hardshell category, TdT was a nail-biter down to the very end! Loggerheads Eliza Ann and Cruz had been battling it out (logger)head to head for 1st place the entire race. They finished only 150 km apart, with Eliza Ann earning the ultimate victory and Cruz taking 2nd. Rounding out the podium in 3rd place is green turtle Angel, who just barely pulled ahead of fellow green turtle Reefie at the end. Check out all the turtles' final migration distances below!

Each year, sea turtles are tracked for approximately three months as they leave their respective nesting beaches and race to complete a turtle marathon.

The Tour de Turtles competitors will swim with the goal of being the first turtle to swim the furthest distance during the migration marathon. This fun, family event kicks off every July at our Barrier Island Center in Melbourne Beach, FL, with the live release of two satellite tagged sea turtles!
